
The Ney award is awarded annually to the highest-performing food service operations throughout the Navy.

Saluting a century of service

Flight operations at NAS North Island

The mission of the Navy is to maintain, train and equip combat-ready Naval forces capable of winning wars, deterring aggression and maintaining freedom of the seas. The Navy is unique in that it fulfills a broad role that encompasses everything from combat to peacekeeping to humanitarian assistance. A primary way

With this demanding task in mind, it is vital that aviators are trained on the most technologically advanced aircraft in the world, and on ranges and areas that allow them to "train like you fight." One area that requires dedicated and consistent training is preparing to land on a ship. Naval Air Station North Island and Naval Outlying Landing Field Imperial Beach support this training at Navy airfields.

Flight paths and noise caused by military aircraft are an ongoing issue for residents near

military installations. Naval Base Coronado (NBC) leadership wants to assure residents that their complaints and concerns are a top priority.

NBC leadership considers the relationship with the surrounding community crucial and has a variety of strategies for noise management to include the avoidance of flight routes and altitude restrictions in noise-sensitive areas and by placing limits on the types of flight operations, when possible.

"We are committed to the safety and well-being of our neighbors and understand that our operations create noise," said Capt. Scott T. Mulvehill, NBC commanding officer. "However, it is our responsibility to facilitate the training of the Navy's pilots to meet our nation's overarching mission."

Recently, base leadership established a Community Concerns Hotline as well as a section on the NBC web page to assist residents in getting their voices heard.

Mulvehill said it is important residents understand that there are several contributing factors that dictate air operations on base.

"Ultimately the Federal Aviation Administration is responsible for management and control of the National Airspace System," said Mulvehill. "Operations at San Diego International Airport influence all aircraft operations throughout San Diego County. Naval Air Station North Island's close proximity to San Diego International results in the FAA directing some of our operations. Simply put, there are many airfields in a small area, therefore we have to work with each other to ensure all missions and services are provided."

In 2016 NASNI conducted a total of 83,181 airfield operations, which included takeoffs and landings from the runways, or one of the multiple helicopter pads located on the airfield. Of those operations, approximately 8,000 instrument approaches occurred to runway 29. This particular flight path brings aircraft along the beach. These approaches are a training requirement for both the pilots and the controllers. This practice allows them to be ready for bad weather, at sea and when far from home.

"We limit our overall operations to the greatest extent practical by limiting transient aircraft to mission essential operations," said Mulvehill. "The base is tasked with training missions for both pilots ATVs on their way to infantry Marines

by Mathuel Browne MARINE CORPS BASE QUANTICO, Va. - Infantry Marines will soon receive ultralight off-road vehicles that will improve mission readiness by providing rapid logistics support in the field.

Program Executive Officer Land Systems, the Corps' acquisition arm for major land programs, is expected to deliver 144 Utility Task Vehicles to the regiment-level starting later this month - a mere six months from contract award. The rugged all-terrain vehicle can carry up to four Marines or be converted to haul 1,500 pounds of supplies. With minimal armor, the UTV can quickly haul extra ammunition and provisions, or injured Marines, while preserving energy and stealth.

"The Marine's pack is getting heavier, and they are carrying more gear than ever down range," said Jessica Turner, team lead for Internally Transportable Vehicles/Utility Task Vehicles at PEO LS. "Infantry Marines were looking for a capability that would lessen the load while increasing the area of operation, and the UTV is that solution.'

The UTV is a new capability for the fleet. Measuring roughly 12 feet long, the commercially acquired diesel vehicle is modular, with back seats that convert into a small cargo bed. Thanks to its small size, the UTV fits inside MV-22 Ospreys and CH-53E helicopters for easy transport to remote locations and greater tactical support.

PEO LS joined a Marine Corps Special Operations Command contract to deliver the capability to Marines in such a short amount of time.

We have taken an off-theshelf capability and leveraged it with other commands to maximize the effort," said Eugene Morin, product manager for Legacy Light Tactical Vehicles at PEO LS. "The continued challenge for the Marine Corps is finding commercial-off-theshelf items that satisfy the needs of Marines. Through partnerships like this, we can find the solutions we need."

In exchange, MARSOC partnered with the Marine Corps Warfighting Laboratory to run field user evaluations on the UTV to ensure it met the needs of the warfighter.

"One key takeaway from the MCWL testing was user feedback from Infantry Marines," said Mark Godfrey, vehicle capabilities integration officer at Marine Corps Combat Development and Integration. "MCWL did demonstrations such as casualty evacuation and maximum payload, and were able to tell us Marines' thoughts on the value of the vehicle.

The UTV program also satisfies the infantry's requirement to maneuver more rapidly and deeply throughout the battlespace.

Much like larger tactical vehicles, Marines authorized to drive the UTV will be required to complete operator training as well as additional off-road vehicle safety procedures.

'One reason for the driving course is the UTV is an offroad vehicle," Turner said. "The UTV's suspension, handling and the way it distributes power is a lot different than a regular vehicle."

Eighteen vehicles will be delivered to specific infantry regiments, with the first shipment going to I and II Marine Expeditionary Force in Febru-ary, and III MEF in March and April. The Marine Corps will continue to seek ways to lever-

U.S. condemns North Korean ballistic missile launch

WASHINGTON - The United States strongly condemns North Korea's weekend ballistic missile launch and its other recent attempts and will take all necessary measures to deter and defeat threats to U.S. and ally territories and citizens. Pentagon spokesman Capt. Jeff Davis told reporters Monday.

Davis said that on Feb. 11, U.S. Strategic Command detected and tracked what was assessed as a North Korean missile launch of a probable intermediate-range ballistic missile.

"[The launch] occurred near the North Korean northwestern city of Kusong and it flew roughly due east out into the Sea of Japan about 500 kilometers [more than 310 miles]," Davis said, adding that the missile landed in international waters.

"The North American Aerospace Defense Command determined the missile launch did not pose a threat to North America," he said. "We also worked very quickly with our Japanese and

South Korean allies to make sure it did not pose a threat to them either.

The captain said the United States maintains capabilities to respond quickly and intercept missiles from North Korea if they do pose a threat to the nation or its allies.

Majesty's coastguard received an emergency beacon from Clyde Challenger, a 60-foot sailboat transiting from the Azores back to the UK Feb. 10.

The sailboat took on a rogue wave which snapped its mast, leaving it stranded in severe sea state and weather conditions.

A nearby ship, UK tanker CPO Ferdinand, responded to the distress signal and shielded and monitored the vessel until further relief could arrive

curity Council resolutions that explicitly prohibit North Korea's launches using ballistic missile technology," Davis said.

"North Korea's unlawful weapons programs represent a clear, grave threat to our national security," he added. "North Korea openly states that its ballistic missiles are intended to deliver nuclear weapons to strike cities

in the launch.

Sailors from Patrol Squadron 45 responded to the call, and dispatched two crews and two Poseidon aircraft to provide aerial coverage while waiting for Royal navy destroyer HMS Dragon (D35) to arrive on station.

"P-8 presence on station provided continuous, rescue scene condition updates to Her Majesty's coastguard and facilitated a communications relay between the Clyde Challenger crew and the HMS Dragon," said Lt. Rodrigo Cunha, VP-45 P-8A tactical coordinator.



Mattis: U.S. remains committed to NATO as alliance transforms

by Cheryl Pellerin WASHINGTON - The United States remains committed to NATO, history's most successful military alliance, as it transforms to match the changing character of war, Defense Secretary Jim Mattis told reporters traveling with him to this week's NATO defense ministers conference in Brussels.

In addition to attending the conference and meeting with counterparts from other NATO member nations, Mattis also will host a meeting of ministers from the coalition to counter the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria during his second international trip as defense secretary.

"Our commitment remains to NATO, [which is] ... in the midst of transformation. Why? You've watched as the character of war over this last dozen years has changed itself, and as the character of war changes, so must the character of the militaries that address them," Mattis said.

To underscore the alliance's commitment to change, the secretary noted that the only NATO command with a headquarters in the United States is Allied Command Transformation.

"The whole point of that command is to transform NATO, so ... we go to Brussels where we all get together, we talk about that transformation, [and] we guide it. NATO has transformed over these last 20 years, and it must continue to transform," Mattis said.

As secretary, he added, his approach to NATO is "full-speed ahead and listen, learn, help and lead."

Listening is first, he said. "Learn what other people face, help them wherever I can, because they've been allies. They stood by us after New York was attacked and so many decades before that. And many of them have lost boys, lost women in fighting the enemy that attacked America. And then lead, [because] America has a leadershin role." On Feb. 17, Mattis will attend the Munich Security Conference in Germany, where he will hold a series of meetings with key international counterparts.

The trip will underscore the U.S. commitment to the NATO alliance and to defeating ISIS, according to a Feb. 10 DoD news release announcing the secretary's trip.

NATO secretary general previews alliance defense ministerial

by Jim Garamone WASHINGTON - NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg previewed the meeting of defense ministers that started Feb.15, saying the leaders will sharpen the alliance's response to a more challenging security environment.

Stoltenberg told reporters at NATO headquarters in Belgium that the security challenges are real and complicated, but the alliance is responding and he noted an increase in defense spending by NATO allies.

Defense Secretary Jim Mattis is also at the meeting in Brussels.

"NATO is founded on the bond between North America and Europe, and in good times and bad, that bond has been unbreakable," Stoltenberg said. "We stand together. We defend each other. And that is good both for Europe, and for North America. I'm confident that defense ministers at our meet-

ing tomorrow and the day after tomorrow once again are going to reconfirm the enduring importance of the transatlantic bond."

The alliance is putting in place the infrastructure to implement the decisions made at last year's NATO Summit in Warsaw. This includes deploying four multinational battle groups to Latvia, Estonia, Lithuania and Poland.

"We are also stepping up our ability to anticipate and respond to crises in the south in order to project stability in our neighborhood," Stoltenberg said.

NATO nations have pledged to invest 2 percent of gross domestic product in defense capabilities. The United States, Britain, Poland, Estonia and Greece are the only countries at or above this monetary goal now, defense officials have said, but other countries have reversed the downward trend and have increased defense expenditures. "NATO's continuous adaptation requires responsibilities to be shared fairly among allies," Stoltenberg said. "Fair burdensharing and increased defense spending underpins the transatlantic Alliance."

The alliance nations have responded to the threats from Russia to the east and the transnational threats of terrorism emanating from the Middle East. "After many years with steep cuts in defense spending,

Lt. Lindianna Steffan, mission commander, and her P-8 crew arrived on station and established a 30-minute communications window with Clyde Challenger, maintaining updates on the crew's status and overall health of the vessel.

"It was a privilege to be the communications relay and provide the crew with any updates to the status of their rescue," said Lt. Caroline Sabatt, VP-45 P-8A tactical coordinator. "We were thrilled to be able to inform them when HMS Dragon was inbound and provide their instructions for rescue. You could hear the relief in their voices knowing that help was on the way and the rescue would commence soon."

Dragon was conducting routine operations when the ship was diverted to assist in the rescue operations. The second P-8A crew, led by Lt. Cmdr. Michael Winters remained on station and assisted vectoring Dragon to intercept Clyde Challenger. we have turned a corner," the secretary general said. "Today, I can present to you new, updated figures for 2016. Defense spending in real terms has increased by 3.8 percent among European allies and Canada."

The jump is "significantly higher than what we had originally foreseen" and is indicative of the seriousness of the situation. "It amounts to roughly 10 billion dollars more for our defense," he said.


The crew was able to maintain eyes on Clyde Challenger and witnessed four of the crew members' safe transfer from the sailboat to Dragon. All 14 personnel on Clyde Challenger were safely rescued.

"Supporting this mission highlights the P-8A's ability to respond quickly to a crisis situation, in this case 1,500 nautical miles from home base," said Capt. Bill Ellis, commander, Task Force 67. "While on scene, our crews were able to monitor and provide updates of the Clyde Challenger through the night, and help coordinate the arrival and rescue efforts of HMS Dragon. For the crew of the Clvde Challenger and their worried family members at home, it's reassuring to know that someone is watching over them while help is on the way. I'm very proud of the VP-45 'Pelicans' for their rapid response and role in this rescue at sea."

VP-45 is in the 6th Fleet area of operation in support of U.S. national security interests in Europe and Africa.

Navy christens LCS USS Tulsa

WASHINGTON - The Navy christened its newest Independence-variant littoral combat ship, USS Tulsa (LCS 16), Feb. 11

address. Kathy Taylor, former mayor of Tulsa, is the ship's sponsor.

"The christening of the future USS Tulsa serves as a tribute to the extraordinary work done by our nation's shipbuilders and brings this great ship one step closer to joining our fleet," said the Honorable Sean Stackley, acting secretary of the Navy. "Our nation can be proud of this crew as they ready the ship to represent the city of Tulsa and the United States, around the world for years to come."

The future USS Tulsa is the second U.S. Navy ship to be named in honor of the city of Tulsa. The first USS Tulsa was an Asheville-class gunboat designated as PG-22 that served from 1923 to 1944 before being renamed Tacloban. She earned two battle stars for World War II service. A cruiser to be named USS Tulsa was also authorized for construction during World War II, but the contract was canceled before it was built.

Jansen receives NJP at Admiral's Mast

WASHINGTON - Rear Adm. Adrian Jansen received nonjudicial punishment (NJP) at Admiral's Mast held Feb. 10 by Commander, United States Fleet Forces, Adm. Phil Davidson. A Defense Criminal Investigative Service investigation revealed violations of the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) associated with Jansen's involvement with Glenn Defense Marine Asia (GDMA).

The investigation showed that Jansen had an inappropriately familiar relationship with Leonard Francis, Chief Executive Officer and President of Glenn Defense Marine Asia, while serving as the Naval Attache, Jakarta, Indonesia from 2010 to 2013. He attended multiple private dinners paid for by Leonard Francis over the course of two years, and accepted gifts of wine. The gifts of dinners and wine totaled more than \$5,000, and exceeds amounts permitted by law and authorized under Department of Navy regulations. In addition, Jansen had a duty to report his contact with Leonard Francis, as well as the acceptance of the gifts, and he failed to do so.

During NJP, Davidson found Jansen guilty of violating article 92 of the UCMJ. Jansen received a punitive letter of reprimand and forfeiture of \$3,750 pay per month for two months.

In conjunction with Admiral's Mast, Jansen has submitted a voluntary request for retirement that will be reviewed in accor-

dance with existing processes.

OKINAWA, Japan - The staff of Commander, Task Force 76/Expeditionary Strike Group 7 participated in a one-week planning exercise and warfare academics recently in preparation for Fleet Synthetic Training-Joint Exercise (FST-J) to be held later this spring.

The expeditionary strike group staff participates in FST-J annually to ensure readiness to command over forces in a wide spectrum of mission sets.

Facilitated by Tactical Training Group Pacific (TTGP), the planning exercise included representatives from 3d Marine Expeditionary Brigade (MEB), Amphibious Squadron (PHIBRON) 11, CTF 72, CTF 70, CTF 74, and USS *Chancellorsville* (CG 62). Staff members and counterparts worked together in an effort to increase integration in achieving a common mission objective and leveraging each staff's functional capabilities.

"This training is more insight into what we do as CTF. This helps our staff and planners become better-rounded in their support roles and it gives them an opportunity to gain further professional development," said Lt. Cmdr. Patrick Griffin, CTF 76 operational support officer and lead planner for FST-J. "It's critical that we execute this certification as an integrated team, in order for us to further the 7th Fleet mission."

Posthumous advancement for Navy SEAL

WASHINGTON - The Navy announced recently that a SEAL killed in action two weeks ago will be posthumously advanced to senior chief petty officer.

Chief Special Warfare Operator William "Ryan" Owens, 36, of Peoria, Illinois, died Jan. 29, 2017, in the Arabian Peninsula of Yemen, of wounds sustained in a raid against al-Qaida.

The Navy approved an exception to policy request for Owens' posthumous advancement, effective the day of his death.

Navy College Program app available for mobile devices

A new application for mobile devices which allows Sailors onthe-go access to many features of the Navy College Program (NCP) is available as of Feb. 8.

"The Navy College Program app offers Sailors mobile access to voluntary education planning tools, a counseling scheduler, and applications previously available only through the Navy College Offices or the Virtual Education Center," said Lt. Cmdr. Nick Turner, the Naval Education and Training Professional Development Center's Voluntary Education Program deputy director. "This app allows the completion of required training, processing of Tuition Assistance (TA) requests, and helps Sailors obtain counseling without being tied to a computer."

The Navy College Program app is divided into several sections for ease of navigation:

* Tuition Assistance - Links users to the My Education Web-TA portal so they can submit a TA application and view the sta-

Warrior transition program expands

by MCC James C. Brown The Navy recently announced all individual augmentees (IAs) serving in U.S. Central Command (CENTCOM) or U.S. Africa Command (AFRICOM) areas of responsibility will attend Warrior Transition Program (WTP) in Sembach, Germany.

Additionally, all IAs will now attend some form of WTP, either in Germany or Norfolk.

Nestled in the Rhineland-Palatinate state of Germany lies the small Army base of Sembach. A tenant command. Expeditionary Combat Readiness Center (ECRC) Sembach Det., hosts a 3-5 day Warrior Transition Program-Third Location Decompression (WTP-TLD) program which focuses on redeploying Sailors' transitional process amid farmland and rolling hills.

Capt. Joseph Rehak, ECRC commanding officer noted, 'Germany provides an ideal location for our Sailors to reflect and rejuvenate after deployments down range in support of continuing operations. I am happy to say that we are now able to provide a much needed break to Sailors redeploying from the CENTCOM and AFRI-COM theaters of operations."

Senior Chief Culinary Specialist John Conniff, a redeployer from Isa Air Base, said of his experience at Sembach following deployment, "It's been very relaxing. It's nice to have the decompression downtime before returning to the states.'

The aim of WTP-TLD is time for the Sailor who is not on the battlefield or on the homefront. The process is designed to assist in an IA's reintegration into life out of the theater of operations, with their families, friends, and careers. The program consists of instructional time, meeting with mental health and religious

Rehak said, "The Warrior Transition Program provides Sailors time to reflect, learn skills, and meet partner organizations that will support in the transition from deployment to home life."

Lt. j.g. Johnny Fugit, a redeployer from afloat forward staging base-interim USS Ponce (AFSB(I) 15), said, "I found it (WTP) really beneficial. Having a few days to catch my breath and reset has been important and enjoyable.'

The addition of AFRICOM redeployers, as well as seeing those from more CENTCOM sites than before, may lead to the staff at Sembach seeing a noticeable impact on operations.

Cmdr. Patrick Doyle, ECRC Sembach Det. officer in charge said, "The staff here is really dedicated to this mission and making sure that every returning Sailor has the best experience possible, even as we expect to double the number of people passing through WTP. For us, it's a wonderful chance to have a positive impact on fellow Sailors."

Following their time at WTP in Sembach, Reserve IAs will report to ECRC to complete the demobilization process before returning to their Navy Operational Support Center (NOSC). Active-duty IAs will return to their parent commands.

The Warrior Transition Program facilitates IA Sailors' reintegration process following a Global Force Management (GFM) directed deployment by providing Combat and Operational Stress Control Continuum (COSC) workshops, collecting gear and weapons, and coordinating onward movement.

ECRC provides processing, equipping, training, certification, and proactive family support to active duty for special work (ADSW) Sailors, individual augmentees, and provisional units throughout all deployment phases in support of combatant command (COCOM) requirements, contingency operations, or national crises.

Necessity reveals strength when parenting alone

deployment."

Most military spouses have endured car breakdowns, hot water heater leaks and computer "blue screens of death" when our active duty spouses were on travel or deployments. Those home front mishaps are annoying, but what about when our kids are injured or sick? Is the emotional strain of handling a major parenting crisis too much for one military spouse to handle?

Teach your children the importance of good dental habits

DEAR MAYO CLINIC: Is it true that some children are more susceptible to getting cavities than others? My 11-year-old has never had a cavity, but my 6-year-old already has needed four fillings. What's the best way to prevent cavities in kids? At what age should they start flossing?

ANSWER: Some people may be more prone to tooth decay than others, even within the same family. To give your children the best protection against cavities, teach them the importance of dental health by showing them how to care for their teeth. That includes daily flossing from a very young age. It's important for parents to have good oral hygiene, too. Make sure you and your children see a

dentist regularly.

in the hard surface of your teeth become damaged and develop holes, or cavities. Left untreated, the holes get bigger and can eventually lead to pain, infection and tooth loss. A combination of factors can trigger tooth decay, including bacteria in the mouth, teeth not being cleaned well, and eating or drinking lots of sugary foods and beverages.

transmit bacteria.

Brushing teeth at least twice a day - and ideally after every meal - is still one of the best ways to prevent tooth decay. Using a mechanical toothbrush with a rotating head is a good choice. They do a much better job of cleaning teeth than manual toothbrushes. Some include a two-minute timer, so it stays on for the amount of time dentists recommend teeth be brushed. That makes it easier for kids to get a thorough cleaning each time they brush.

Make sure the toothpaste your family uses contains fluoride. Research has shown that fluoride is effective in reducing cavities. Many cities now add fluoride to drinking water and that helps pre-

vent tooth decay, too. If your city has fluoridated water, give your children tap water to drink rather than bottled water to get the benefits of the fluoride. Many dentists give children fluoride treatments during their dental visits, as well. For people who seem particularly susceptible to cavities, a dentist also may recommend a daily fluoride rinse

Ask your dentist about applying dental sealants to your children's teeth. A sealant is a protective coating applied to the chewing surface of back teeth, sealing off grooves that tend to collect food and protecting tooth enamel. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends sealants for all school-age children.

Your children should start flossing as soon as possible. Flossing is the most effective way to remove food and plaque from between teeth. Encourage them to floss at least once or twice a day for the best cavity protection. Flossing is particularly important for children between the teeth in the back of their mouths, as children tend not to brush as well in those areas as they do in the front.

Lowering your children's intake of snacks and beverages that contain sugar also can help prevent tooth decay. Sugar is linked to tooth decay because if sugar is not cleaned off teeth well, bacteria in your mouth feed on it, producing acids. In time, acid wears away the teeth's hard outer layer of enamel

and the process of decay begins. Drinks with high sugar content, such as fortified fruit juices and carbonated beverages, can trigger tooth decay, especially when sipped throughout the day.

Finally, take your children to see a dentist on a regular basis. Most children need dental checkups twice a year, although some may require them more often. Try to choose one dentist and stay with him or her as your children grow. Having a dentist who knows your children's dental history and is familiar with any special needs they have can makes it easier to prevent and catch problems quickly. - Thomas Salinas, D.D.S., Dental Specialties, Mayo Clinic, Rochester. How to spot and prevent deep vein thrombosis: When the clot thickens

by NIH News in Health Lots of things can cause pain and swelling in your leg. But if your symptoms stem from a blood clot deep in your leg, it can be dangerous. Blood clots can happen to anyone, anytime. But some people are at increased risk. Taking steps to reduce your chances of a blood clot forming in your veins can help you avoid potentially serious problems.

Blood clots can arise anywhere in your body. They develop when blood thickens and clumps together. When a clot forms in a vein deep in the body, it's called deep vein thrombosis. Deep vein blood clots typically occur in the lower leg or thigh.

"Deep vein thrombosis has classic symptoms-for example swelling, pain, warmth, and redness on the leg," says Dr. Andrei Kindzelski, an NIH blood disease expert.

"But about 30-40% of cases go

Clues of a Clot

Seek treatment if you have these symptoms. They may signal a deep vein clot or pulmonary embolism:

• swelling of the leg or along a vein in the leg

• pain or tenderness in the leg, which you may feel only when stand-

ing or walking • increased warmth in the area of

- the leg that's swollen or painful • red or discolored skin on the leg
 - unexplained shortness of breath
 - pain with deep breathing
 - coughing up blood

unnoticed, since they don't have typical symptoms." In fact, some people don't realize they have a deep vein clot until it causes a more serious condition.

Deep vein clots-especially those in the thigh-can break off and travel through the bloodstream. If a clot lodges in an artery in the lungs, it can block blood flow and lead to a sometimes-deadly condition called pulmonary embolism. This disorder can damage the lungs and reduce blood oxygen levels, which can harm other organs as well.

Some people are more at risk for deep vein thrombosis than others. "Usually people

who develop deep vein thrombosis have some level of thrombophilia, which means their blood clots more rapidly or easily," Kindzelski says. Getting a blood clot is usually the first sign of this condition because it's hard to notice otherwise. In these cases, lifestyle can contribute to a blood clot forming-if you don't move enough, for example. Your risk is higher if you've recently had surgery or broken a bone, if you're ill and in bed for a long time, or if you're traveling for a long time (such as during long car or airplane rides).

Having other diseases or conditions can also raise your chances of a blood clot. These include a stroke, paralysis (an inability to move), chronic heart disease, high blood pressure, surgical procedure, or having been recently treated for cancer.

Women who take hormone therapy pills or birth control pills, are pregnant, or within the first 6 weeks after giving birth are also at higher risk. So are those who smoke or who are older than 60. But deep vein thrombosis can happen at any age.

You can take simple steps to lower your chances for a blood clot. Exercise your lower leg muscles if you're sitting for a long time while traveling. Get out of bed and move around as soon as you're able after having surgery or being ill.

The more active you are, the better your chance

of avoiding a blood clot. Take any medicines your doctor prescribes to prevent clots after some types of surgery.

A prompt diagnosis and proper treatment can help prevent the complications of blood clots. See your doctor immediately if you have any signs or symptoms of deep vein thrombosis or pulmonary embolism (see the Wise Choices box). A physical exam and other tests can help doctors determine whether you've got a blood clot

There are many ways to treat deep vein thrombosis. Therapies aim to stop the blood clot from getting bigger, prevent the clot from breaking off and moving to your lungs, or reduce your chance of having another blood clot. NIH scientists continue to research new medicines and better treatment options.

If you think you may be at risk for deep vein thrombosis, talk with your doctor.



NAVSUP FLC San Diego conducts first fuel delivery at new fuel pier

SAN DIEGO - NAVSUP Fleet Logistics Center (FLC) San Diego conducted the first fuel delivery utilizing its new Defense Fuel Support Point (DFSP) Point Loma fuel pier as it topped off Military Sealift Command fleet replenishment oiler USNS Henry J. Kaiser (T-AO 187) Feb. 10 in San Diego.

The fueling marks the nearcompletion of Military Construction Project (MILCON) P-1306, an \$84 million renovation awarded in 2013 as part of a series of fuel facilities upgrades aimed at extending facility life expectancy, reducing operating costs, providing increased storage capability, and improving overall safety.

"Fuels play an integral role in our overall warfighter readiness," said Commanding Officer Capt. Michelle Morse. "The old pier provided more than a century of service, and we are pleased that this new, more technologically advanced pier will keep our Navy and allied forces well equipped to perform their tasks and missions - whether for training or emergent contingencies - well beyond the next generation of warfighters."

The NAVSUP FLC San Diego DFSP fuels team is charged with providing petroleum, oil, and lubricant logistics support to 86 homeported ships, submarines, and transient vessels.

It is the cornerstone for providing tactical fuel support to Navy command units operating in the southern California operations area, supporting the largest concentration of naval forces in the world.

With 17 fueling stations, the new pier is equipped to issue JP-5 jet fuel, diesel fuel (marine), and lubricating oils, while also having the capability to offload contaminated petroleum products. Military Sealift Command-contracted fuel tanker MT Empire State (T-AOT 5193) was the first customer to offload such products at the pier Feb. 2.

"The new pier is a shining example of mission accomplishment through successful partnerships and team effort,' said Southwest Regional Fuels Officer Lt. Cmdr. Brian Madden.



The new, double-decker fuel pier is the first of its kind; developed with evolving environmental and seismic standards in mind and boasting a 75-year minimum service life design.

"When you are in the business of providing 400 million gallons of fuels per year at a rate of 300,000 gallons per hour, it is absolutely critical to have the most advanced equipment and

facilities available," said Morse. "The Navy and its customers are going to benefit from even safer, more environmentallyconscious fueling evolutions moving forward."

An official ribbon cutting ceremony will be held following the next phase of project completion milestones. Total completion of MILCON P-1306 is slated for early 2018.

America ARG conducts Group Sail

PACIFIC OCEAN - The America Amphibious Ready Group (ARG) successfully completed a multi-ship training exercise, Group Sail, Feb. 10 off the coast of southern California.

Group Sail is one of the predeployment underways which allow the three ARG ships, USS *America* (LHA 6), USS *San Diego* (LPD 22) and USS *Pearl Harbor* (LSD 52) to exercise together in a maritime environment. Components of the 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit Air Combat Element are also participating in Group Sail, conducting air qualifications aboard America.

As part of the comprehensive pre-deployment training workups, the ships spent a week operating underway, performing highly technical evolutions in the three-ship ARG construct. Training evolutions included threat detection, air defense, and fast attack craft exercises, with additional evolution in flight quarters and replenishments-atsea. The synthesized training and real-world evolutions allowed the ships to practice the composite warfare concept, where each ship took a leading role in monitoring, protecting, and fighting the battleship elements.

skills are vital to the America ARG's progression through the preparation phase as the ARG readies for deployment later this year.

"Group Sail is about getting all three of the *America* ARG ships out to sea and flexing the composite warfare concept," said Capt. Homer Denius, commanding officer of Amphibious Squadron 3. "Pre-deployment training exercises allow us to operate in a safe, realistic environment. Once we understand how to operate the three ships together, we can then embark our Marine Corps team and train in a fully-integrated environment."

Navy logistics, USS *Coronado* complete voyage repair availability

SINGAPORE - Commander, Logistics Group Western Pacific Ship Repair Unit and crew from Independence-class littoral combat ship USS *Coronado* (LCS 4) completed a successful voyage repair availability period in Singapore Feb. 10.

The seven-day repair period will enable *Coronado* to continue its mission, conduct cooperative security engagements with regional partner nations and enhance maritime security relationships during the ship's rotational deployment to the Indo-Asia-Pacific.

"The strategic location of the COMLOG WESTPAC SRU and the importance of work that is done here cannot be understated," said Sean Jermyn, project manager for *Coronado*. "Our location in Singapore enables us to sustain and provide timely voyage repairs for ships operating throughout this region."

The COMLOG WESTPAC SRU facilitated maintenance on *Coronado*'s main propulsion systems, the ship's lift platform, radars, and the ship's communication systems.

Additionally, repairs and preventative maintenance checks were performed on the ship's Collection Holding Transfer (CHT) tank, which required the deactivation of all ship's bathroom, shower and galley facilities for a five-day period. The repairs were accomplished while allowing *Coronado*'s crew to utilize local facilities as a substitute for the affected services due to the proximity of the ship's berthing at the Sembawang Wharf.

The synchronization between *Coronado*'s crew and the SRU was crucial to the success of the voyage repair availability, enhancing the Navy's ability to implement agile and adaptive logistical support throughout the Indo-Asia-Pacific.

"The ability to operate forward in the region is negated if we don't have the ability to perform maintenance repairs," said Terrence Burns, marine surveyor for *Coronado*. "Without these capabilities, ships would have to go all the way to Yokosuka or Guam to receive necessary repairs, meaning the ships would have to choose between executing their mission in a limited capacity or leaving the area for an extended time frame."

Since the Mission Bay Model Yacht Pond is relatively narrow, the fleet was divided in two and the races were run in pairs of heats





Picking the right collar for your dog

Q: Our lab/pit mix puppy is now 8 months old and we got a metal choke collars to stop her from pulling when we walk her. However even with it on she will pull ahead of us until she actually starts to choke and cough and yet she never seems to get the idea. How is this supposed to work? Does it not bother her when it gets so tight around her neck? - Brad Williams, Macon, GA

A: A choke collar actually should be called a training collar. The objective with it is not to choke the dog but to get its attention when they start to pull away. It needs to be put on the dog so that when you give it a yank it tightens up and then quickly releases. You do not want it to tighten around the neck.

Personally, one should only use these collars when they have the time, the patience and the knowledge to use them properly.

I think a better solution for your dog is a gentle leader or head halter. These collars go around the face as a halter and the leash is attached to a ring under the dog's jaw. If the halter is fitted correctly then when the dog pulls ahead the lead turns him or her around so that the dog is now facing you.

Be sure to get the type of gentle leader that attached to the dog's collar. Some dogs have been able to get the leaders off themselves. It also helps if you first practice with the gentle leader on the dog indoors until you and the dog are comfortable.

The only problem that I have seen with the gentle leader is it resembles a muzzle to some people, so you may get some funny looks as you walk the dog but your shoulders will be thanking you.

Q: My bunny and guinea pig seem to shed constantly. In the past I have seen that you advised giving flax seed oil to dogs and cats to cut down on shedding. Does this work on bunnies and guinea pigs as well? - Jennifer Castro. Allentown. PA

A: I actually have tried this on my own small mammal pets - I sprayed the oil on their salad greens to see if it makes a difference. However, when I sprayed the flaxseed oil on the greens the bunnies and guinea pigs would either eat around the oil or not touch the greens at all

Thus far it seems that the only thing I can do to make a difference is to comb and brush them every single day. If any other readers out there have found another solution to the shedding issue of bunnies and guinea pigs, I would be happy to hear from you.
